COVID-19 Trusted sources of information

Latest national announcements

Avian Influenza

Last week an Avian Influenza Prevention Zone was applied to everyone who keeps poultry or captive birds in Great Britain.

The prevention zone means bird keepers across the country must follow biosecurity measures. The measures have been introduced because of the recent number of confirmed cases of Avian Influenza in Great Britain. Avian Influenza is also present in Europe, and wild bird migration brings birds to Great Britain from areas where highly pathogenic Avian Influenza is present.

Major funding boost for voluntary sector support

Community groups across Norfolk will have access to more support thanks to a new partnership, funded by Norfolk County Council.

Voluntary Norfolk, Community Action Norfolk and Norfolk Community Foundation will work together as the **Empowering Communities Partnership**, with Norfolk Community Advice Network and FUSE Norwich alongside as strategic partners.

This partnership marks a 45% increase in the funding provided for this support, in recognition of the role community groups have played throughout the pandemic.

Help on offer includes managing funding and finance; expert training and seminars; volunteer recruitment and deployment; and a series of forums and networking opportunities.

Norfolk wins major government funding

Norfolk has been awarded £6.5 million through the government's community renewal fund. The funding will go towards 14 projects which makes **Norfolk the county with the greatest number of successful applications in England.**

The UK Community Renewal Fund aims to support people and communities most in need across the UK, creating opportunities to trial new approaches and innovative ideas at the local level.

The UK Community Renewal Fund will also help local areas prepare for the launch of the UK Shared Prosperity Fund in 2022, the scheme that will see UK-wide funding at least match EU money, reaching around £1.5 billion a year.

Norfolk Festive Fun opens for children and young people

A programme to keep children active and support families over the Christmas holidays has opened for booking. The majority of sessions will take place between 20th – 23rd December across the county.

Called Big Norfolk Holiday Fun, the programme is being run by Norfolk County Council and Active Norfolk and is funded as part of the Government's Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) programme

Dozens of activities including drama, sports, and arts and crafts, are once again available for all children and young people aged between four and 16 who are at school.

There are limited spaces, booking is on a first-come-first-serve basis. They are free for those eligible for means-tested free school meals and chargeable for a small fee for those not in receipt of free school meals.

Nearly a hundred thousand children to take part in Norfolk pantomime

The Norfolk Music Hub, led by Norfolk County Council, is hosting the event in partnership with <u>Charanga</u>, <u>St George's Theatre</u>, <u>Sheringham Little</u> <u>Theatre</u> and <u>NYMAZ</u>.

Schools and home educators are encouraged to sign up online and will receive a range of resources, so that they can sing along.

The pantomime will take place on Thursday, 16 December and will be signed and captioned to ensure it is accessible to all. So far 91,605 children have signed up to the panto, from 424 schools across the UK. This includes 28,463 children from 176 Norfolk schools.

Childrens Services:

Inspectors praise support for children in care in Norfolk.

Most children in care in Norfolk are well looked after and receive good support for their emotional and mental health and education, Ofsted inspectors have found.

A team of Her Majesty's Inspectors visited Norfolk County Council last month for a two-day focused visit of the council's services for children in its care.

In a letter detailing their findings, inspectors said that social workers know their children well, listen to them and help them to understand their experience. Support for unaccompanied asylum-seeking children was "a strength" and they said that senior leaders "have a coherent vision and are taking action to improve support to children and carers". Ofsted also recognised the swift action" taken in response to the Covid-19 pandemic. The report can be found on the <u>Ofsted website</u>.

Adult Services:

National Safeguarding Adults Week 2020

This will take place from 15 - 21 November 2021.

This year the focus is on the theme of 'Safer Cultures'. Promoting safer cultures is about how organisations and individuals can take steps to minimise harm occurring in the first instance. Norfolk Fire and Rescue Service

Next week, Norfolk Fire and Rescue Service will be highlighting the work of **#RoadSafetyHeroes** as this year's theme for **Road Safety Week**. (Road Safety Week is run by the charity Brake).

Norfolk Fire & Rescue Service deals with many road traffic collisions, with staff seeing first-hand the devastating impact that poor driving, a lack of concentration and distractions can have on innocent lives. This year, Norfolk crews have already attended nearly 500 road accidents, and rescued/supported nearly 300 road users who were involved in them.

They also run the school crossing patrol service on behalf of Norfolk County Council, with a dedicated team supporting families safely to school, another example of Road Safety Heroes.
